### **GLOBAL MISSION TEAM FLOOD RESPONSE**

[Letter Excerpts] Dear Siblings in Christ,

Our companion synod, the Ulanga Kilombero Diocese of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania, has been greatly impacted by severe rains and flooding. Many of you have seen the pictures and video via Facebook posts of the flooding at Lugala Hospital, Tumanini Seminary, the city of Ifakara, and surrounding areas.

Our synod Global Mission team asked directly - "How can we help?" Bishop Renard Mtenji and the leaders in the UKD, many of whom have visited with us, responded with a detailed list. Medicines needed for the hospital and region, food for the schools, resources for restoring the infrastructure - all immediate needs as the flood recedes and their hard work begins. The total of this request is about \$34,000 USD. Your Synod Council authorized this fundraiser to address these needs.

We are asking each congregation to continue to pray for the people of the UKD region, the hospital and schools there. Our DEM, Pastor Liv Larson Andrews, has been teaching us all this song from the new worship resources, All Creations Sings: "Could it be, that we are called, for such a time as this." Yes! I believe that this is our opportunity to respond.

May God continue to watch over the UKD, eastern Africa, and all peoples affected by the rains and floods. May we find ways to respond, to pray, and support our siblings in the UKD.

# PROPERTY TAX ISSUE EXPLAINED (SEE INSERT)

Are you worried about Bonner County property taxes? For the last ten years, FLC/Luther Park at Sandpoint Assisted Living has paid over \$1.44 million in Bonner County property taxes.

The four-page insert found in this edition of the Messenger contains the graphics that Bruce Johnson and Diana Carlson wrote for the April 23, 2024, presentation before the Bonner County Commissioners at their public meeting. Our dedicated LP tax team tirelessly pursues avenues to lower our taxes or secure nonprofit status. We have a collective commitment to see if we can convince our Bonner County Commissioners.

- —Page one is a quick review of Luther Park, why we are a charity, and Financials/Market.
- —Page two is the graph of our nearly \$1.5 million in taxes paid for Luther Park from 2014 to 2023.
- Page three compares market value tax and building size.

The piano and organ were cleaned, carpet vacuumed, woodwork dusted and oiled, pews wiped down, wires dressed, general clean up following the organ console installation. Shelving was provided for the organist to store music and supplies. A custom shelf was built along the railing next to the organ bench for the organist to have music readily at hand during worship services.

### **GETTING TO KNOW PASTOR NORM BRAATZ**

Pastor Norman Braatz, who has lived in Bonners Ferry for twenty-one years and provided pulpit supply at First Lutheran many times over the years, is now a resident at Luther Park.

He grew up on a dairy farm near Green Bay, Wisconsin, with one sister and three brothers. The dairy business is hard work, but Norm enjoyed picking berries and wildflowers, walking in the woods, and being close to nature. At six, he began attending Sunday school which gave him a good start in learning about the Lutheran faith.

When asked at age nine the proverbial, "What do you want to do when you grow up?" he replied, "I think I'd like to be a minister." When his devout Roman Catholic grandmother heard that response she thought carefully for a few minutes before encouragingly answering, "Well, maybe you will!"

A scholarship from St. John's Lutheran Church in Marion, Wisconsin, enabled him to attend Wartburg College in Waverly, Iowa, for his undergraduate degree. He reminisced about receiving a check each semester from his church for his education and feels grateful for the Christian support from his community. He often returned to his hometown to share his faith, preach, and thank his supporters.


Norman received pastoral training at Wartburg Theological Seminary, an Evangelical Lutheran Church in America seminary in Dubuque, Iowa. He graduated in the morning on May 29, 1963 and married Kathryn Karsten in the evening. Life has many blessings and rewards, and he celebrated his faith and life daily.

His wife was a high school business teacher, an excellent mother and friend, and she coordinated the family's events. The Braatzes had two children, Kara and Timothy. While in New York, they became foster parents and adopted their first foster child, Tanya, making them an interracial family. Then, in 1973, they moved to Lake Havasu, Arizona, where they spent 12 years enjoying the area, working with God, and raising their children. They adopted child number four, a boy, Mark, who was six.

Where are the children living now? His oldest daughter Kara lives in Spokane Valley, Timothy in Bonners Ferry, Tanya in California, and Mark in Tennessee.

#### Career:

- Pastor Braatz attended a summer of Clinical Pastoral Training at the University of Michigan Hospital.
- On September 1, 1963, he was ordained in his home church in Wisconsin.
- During his third seminary year, he interned in Brooklyn, New York. On the last day of his internship, he had a conversation with a neighboring pastor which eventually led to a call to be associate pastor at Zion Lutheran in Brooklyn where he served for two years.
- In New York, he received a Master's in Pastoral Counseling and spent eight years in a suburban congregation, Dobbs Ferry Lutheran. He viewed this time as his second education because of the cultural differences between the East and the West.
- In Lake Havasu, Norm served Mount Olive Lutheran for 12 years. It was a mission congregation when he arrived which soon became self-supporting and grew rapidly in that growing new community which was begun in about 1963.
- Beginning in 1985, Norm served Emanuel Lutheran Church, in



La Habra, California, an Orange County suburban congregation, a large church with an excellent staff, for 11 years.

- The last call was to Rancho Palos Verdes, California, where he served for five years at St. Paul's Lutheran Church.

#### **Conclusion:**

When asked what brought him the most joy in his career, he says he aimed to help congregations flourish, grow, and reach their goals. His service to the Lord is reflected throughout his life and in the outcome and growth of each congregation. Norm mentions it is a privilege to serve the Lord. He retired in 2002. During his first nine years of retirement, he was employed in development work for Wartburg Seminary. That means he was one of several parttime, deployed retired pastors who visited alumni and friends of the seminary to raise funds for theological education. For that work, he traveled throughout the Northwest and Northern California about one week a month.

Now, Norm lives at Luther Park, where he is the president of the Resident Council. One never stops a busy and talented person. Norm celebrates every day as a blessing of his faith.
